## CELEBRATING, LEARNING AND SHARING KNOWLEDGE

EcoFest 2025 marked its third year as a region-wide celebration of Tāmaki Makaurau’s environment, with over 300 events from 22 March to 22 April. Delivered through an inclusive marketing strategy, it celebrated local board funders and the region’s diversity. Auckland Council, Henderson-Massey, Waitākere Ranges, Whau, Maungakiekie-Tāmaki and Waitematā local boards were featured across [ecofest.org.nz](http://ecofest.org.nz), signage, collateral and e-newsletters. We acknowledge Emily Harris, who was the previous lead on this event. Localised, whānau-friendly, multilingual events fostered strong community engagement, empowering Aucklanders with practical tools for sustainable living. Workshops received positive feedback, with requests for more learning opportunities, stronger connections, and greater use of Te Ao Māori protocols such as karakia.

## EVERYDAY SUSTAINABILITY

Our EcoMatters Store remained a hub for sustainable living, offering information, resources and practical solutions. This year, we expanded our range to include beautiful, locally made gifts, supporting small producers and encouraging thoughtful consumption. Refill-ready products like toothpaste in glass jars remained popular, and our return schemes helped reduce packaging waste.

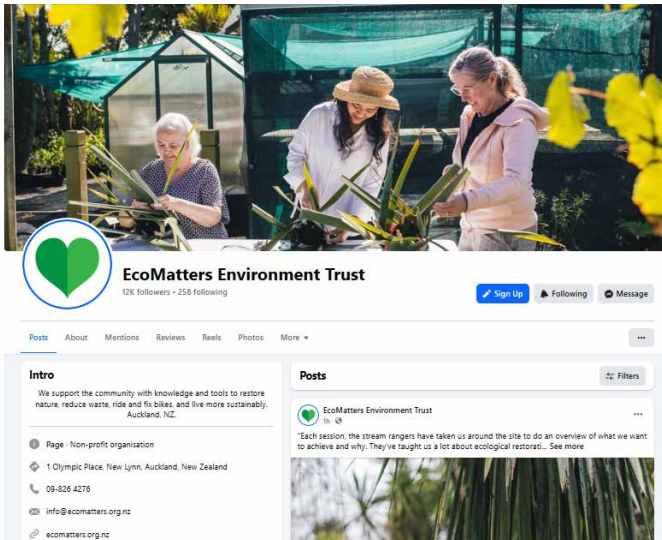

## RESTORING NATURE AND REBUILDING CONNECTIONS

Our Nature team helped hundreds of people connect with their local environment with education, hands-on activities and opportunities to share local knowledge at neighborhood streams and bush areas. These activities support communities to take ownership of restoration efforts in their areas, from the long-running Project Twin Streams work, through to newer outreach in places still carrying the emotional weight of severe weather events.

These initiatives connect us with communities, help neighbours build trust and find a shared purpose. Projects such as Waitākere Ranges Bufferzone and Community Weed Bins offer both practical support to reduce pest plants and a space for conversation, problem-solving and opportunities to build longer-term relationships.

We farewelled our nursery manager Chrissy, who retired after nine years of dedicated service in building our community native plant nursery. Her deep knowledge of how to raise native seedlings has had a profound impact on local restoration efforts and her legacy will live on thanks to the thousands of seeds she and volunteers have nurtured over the years.

## MAI FM PLANTING DAY

We were thrilled to welcome several hundred people back to Olympic Park for another very successful Matariki Community Day, alongside Mai FM and Auckland Zoo. Those attending helped get 500 plants in the ground, potted up 60 seedlings, and enjoyed a range of activities including Rongoā education, games, free kai and giveaways.

Feedback from attendees was overwhelmingly positive, with many saying they enjoyed the family-friendly event which offered cultural connection and interactive learning. We were also delighted to learn that the Mai Matariki Community Day 2024 was nominated for the Te Ao Māori initiative category in the 2025 NZ Radio and Podcast Awards, giving national recognition to a community-led event.

We love working alongside local tamariki and rangatahi. Here's what Hebe and Tyler from Green Bay Primary's Room 14 had to say in their school newsletter about time with our Nature team:

For four months we have been working with EcoMatters to tidy up our local reserves. At our most recent session, we had a group of people mulching, people weeding and people cleaning up the rubbish. EcoMatters helps kids contribute to the environment and inspire other classes and younger students to do so also. Overall, it has been a fun experience and we've learnt lots of new things in the reserves.

## PEDAL POWER IN COMMUNITY HUBS

Our goal of getting more people on bikes so they can experience the joy and freedom that comes with cycling gained further momentum. More than 35,000 people visited the nine bike hubs we operate across Tāmaki Makaurau, including the three most recently opened hubs in Forrest Hill, Grey Lynn and Manukau. We're proud to be a part of the wider Auckland network of 14 hubs, supported by Auckland Transport.

Our free ebike loans scheme also expanded to seven of these nine hubs, offering a wider range of bikes. The two-week loan gives people a real chance to see how an ebike could fit into their lifestyle. Many users tell us it's the final nudge they needed to make the switch, for their health, lifestyle and the planet.



I am so grateful to my friend for telling me about EcoMatters' two week ebike loan scheme. I have always loved biking and have been finding it so fun, and it felt amazing to be able to live in alignment with my values. ## RECOGNISING VALUE IN RESOURCES

Our Resources team champions the value in all materials. In partnership with Auckland Council’s Waste Solutions team, we connected with communities to help them understand the changes to their council bin services and trialled new ideas to encourage people to use their bins correctly. We were thrilled to host a tour of the food scraps processing facility in Reporoa for a group of community leaders, giving them the confidence to educate others on the benefits of this service.

We provided alternatives to landfill as a disposal option, accepting a range of ewaste and other hard to recycle items including toothpaste tubes, curtains, pool toys and more. We also supported the Sustainable Salons programme, by processing recycling from hair, beauty and grooming businesses.

Our ‘Food Fairy’ Wei visited early childhood centres around Auckland, sharing with tamariki about how and why to use the food scraps bins. This is what one centre had to say about the experience:



“The children really loved it. A great foundation for children who are unaware of this, and also very affirming to those children who actively practice composting food waste at home. We are communicating about what we can put in bins during tea times.”

## HELPING PEOPLE SAVE WATER, ENERGY AND MONEY

Hundreds of Aucklanders got practical tips and tricks on how to live more sustainably and affordably, thanks to support from our Homes team. This year, our team was in touch with more than 560 households to offer water-saving advice. That led to an average 28% reduction in water use, adding up to a collective saving of more than \$131,000 or around \$409 per household.

Another 92 homes received energy assessments, and our advisors were able to help residents access practical support such as account credits, new curtains,

housing advocacy and better power plans. Our Healthy Homes workshops reached almost 200 people, equipping them with the knowledge to make their homes more comfortable, drier and energy-efficient.

While our visits start with a focus on one issue, such as saving water or energy, they frequently develop into broader conversations. People tell us they appreciate the chance to ask questions, get tailored advice and hear about other options for support. Here's what just a few of the people who we visited had to say.

Thank you for taking the time on Tuesday to visit and the advice/changes made. I'm delighted to say that my partner and I have changed our habits and are much more aware of the water usage than we were previously. We tracked the usage over the past two days and we're now only using just above 200L/day.

These recommendations are incredibly helpful. I will be reducing shower times and using eco settings on my appliances. I've bookmarked the composting workshop, and also booked a session with Auckland Council for home energy saving advice.

## GROWING FOOD, GROWING COMMUNITY

Our Food team made a big impact this year, collecting 47,825 kg of food scraps from local businesses and redirecting them to local schools and community gardens, rather than landfill. That's the equivalent of preventing 33,857 kg of CO<sup>2</sup>-e emissions, about the same as taking seven cars off the road for a year. Our teaching gardens continue to provide vibrant spaces for learning and connection, where people come together to grow food, care for soil, and learn about ecosystem restoration.

The high quality compost being created is a welcome boost to our many trees and shrubs in the school surrounds and the wider environmental impact of composting providing a carbon sink is a positive contribution to combatting climate change.

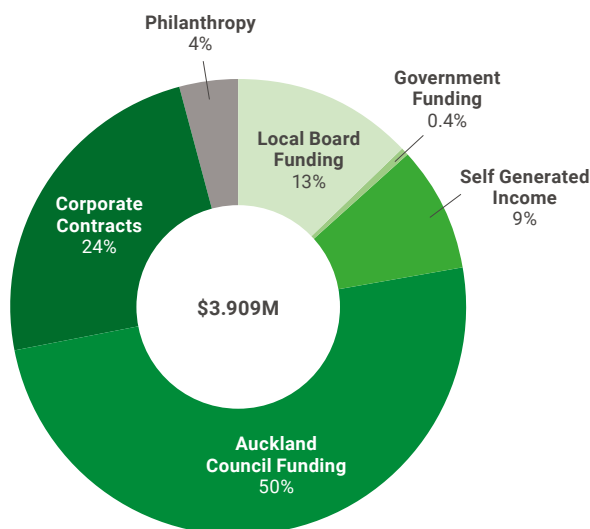

in-kind donations to support events and activities. Our annual turnover has grown steadily over the years, reflecting both the increasing demand for our work and the trust placed in us by funders and partners.

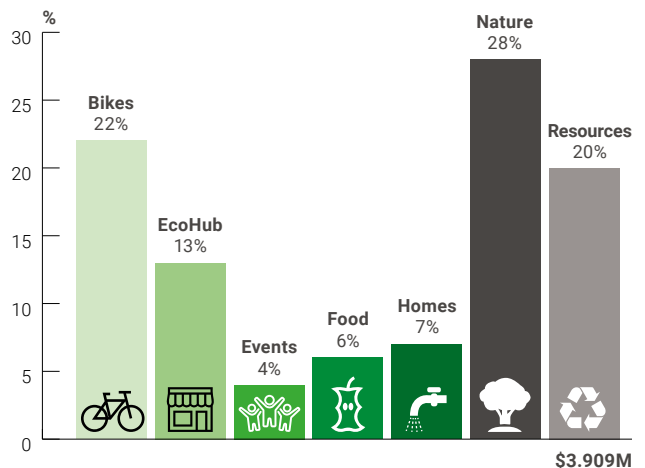
